Messaging for MS1s Who Will Have Pass/Fail Patient Care Clerkships

Don't sacrifice clinical experience for extracurriculars

- Clerkship evaluation comments still count
- Must build skills for 4th year rotations

Foundation students should focus on academics and Step 1

• Block avg is best predictor of Step 1 which is best predictor for shelf exams and Step 2 (which many residency programs emphase)

Normalize Parallel Planning

Messaging to Prepare E24/ MS1 for Competitive Application

For Students who Want to Stand Out

- Focus on 2-3 meaningful activities that show values/commitment during foundations phase
 - At least one with leadership component if possible
 - At least a year long
 - Outcomes
- Not all students need impactful research. Focus on research varies by specialty. (See <u>Specialty Guides</u>.)
 - If recommended, most PDs encourage focus on quality rather than quantity
 - Robust research and peer reviewed publications are helpful for some competitive specialties/programs
 - Research is a useful learning experience (as future lifelong learners in a changing scientific landscape) but a small amount (e.g. in RUOP/III) can suffice
- Work towards excellent evaluation comments/letters of reference during clerkships

Messaging to Support Career Advising & MS1s/MS2s

Strategy for Parallel Plan:

Keep an Open Mind (keep options open)

- Academic profile builds over time: Step 1, core clerkships, specialty rotations, Step 2CK
- Retain a 2nd specialty interest until 4th year if one of the specialties is not IM/FM/Peds/Path
- Why a parallel plan?
 - 70% of students change specialty interest from matriculation to graduation
 - Matching in first round has vastly (and increasingly) greater odds of success (compared with SOAP or reapplication)
- Who must have a <u>Parallel Plan</u>?
 - Students interested in "<u>competitive</u>" <u>specialties</u>
 - If their applicant level of competitiveness is lower than that of their desired specialty as determined by their Specialty Career Advisor
 - If students are still deciding between two specialties
 - If students want to match in a specific geographic location or limited number of programs

Messaging to Support Students with Step 1 Fail & Specialties


Referral & Dual Application Strategy

Please refer student to the Career Advisor for support if they experience a Step 1 fail.

Some specialties accept 2nd attempts although it's still very impactful in how students match, while other specialties very rarely accept 2nd attempts.

A dual application is usually recommended by the Specialty Career Advisor unless students are applying to Internal Medicine, Family Medicine, Pediatrics, or Pathology.





AAMC Careers in Medicine Assessments

- Refer students to AAMC CiM and have them come back to talk with you about it
 Interests, values, skills, personality, specialty indecision scale
- Questions the assessment covers:
 - O What are your subject interests?
 - o Do you prefer surgical, procedural or medical specialty?
 - O What types of professional areas do you want to engage in, research, teaching, or policy?
 - O How much patient contact to you prefer?
 - O What type of patient population?
 - O Where do you want to end up geographically?
